Food/Nutrition- Pam: Moving forward Summer Youth Snack Pack Program – grant from AllCare for Bob the Bus and it will ride this summer with 10 stops. Will start in one week. New project: Seniors 60+ would get bag of fresh vegetables each week– grant was denied, so need to fund program. Would cost \$20K. Working on funding. Schools will have a grab and go for students. Seniors are hurting the most with \$19/month for food. Meetings are second Monday of each month from 2-3pm. Send Pam an email if have funding ideas or want to volunteer. Need volunteers to put together Snack Packs – 200/week. If any businesses need to do community service, this is a great opportunity. pamelaw@brookingsharborfoodbank.org	
Behavioral Health- Nancy : BH workgroup – increasing suicide awareness – great success with QPR Question Persuade Respond training at BH HS. Reaching youth who want to help with resources to those in need. Great feedback on training and have interest from faith based organizations. Celebrate Suicide Awareness week. Reducing BH Stigma, working with HS on stigma-busting. School districts are consumed with the curriculum and have taken a back seat on this effort. Looking to next school year to begin. Law enforcement Crisis Intervention Training – graduated 8 people. Excited about program is growing. Interest from officers to attend advanced Crisis Intervention Training – tactical training. When programs are voluntary, it spurs curiosity and it spreads. Gordon: Can they train	

peers to go along with Crisis Team to go along during a crisis call? Can look at the research and explore, but have confidentiality issues.

Housing & Homelessness- Beth: working to increase participation in monthly meetings. Coalition will submit proposal to county's housing committee for a site. Monitoring HB 2100 which will open funding for nonprofits to apply for emergency shelter dollars. Land acquisition is number one priority. We need to think about what outcomes we want and work backwards from there during crisis incidents. Looking for suggestions to work with law enforcement in a positive way for houseless individuals. Nancy is connecting offline regarding CIT and improving interactions/sharing relationships. Bonnie: mother working to reunify with child but has barrier of safe housing. Beth's efforts are affecting our families and children one person at a time. If anyone knows of RV space to rent, this could help.

Oral Health-Laura McKeane

Port Orford now has dental services! They are moving forward slow but steady. They will see anyone- with or without insurance and will offer vouchers through Coast Community Health.

There was a question as to whether or not there would be a mobile van available. Laura said there currently is not as the person who used to run it is no longer available.

Workforce and Economic Development- (Reminder from May Coalition Meeting)- Annie Donnelly

Finished 5th community health worker training since COVID and they had 14 individuals graduate from the program.

Annie mentioned that there is a big percentage of people not coming back to work, when many are not getting vaccinated and the amount they're making is not worth their lives. Childcare is also a barrier as families don't have options for their children. As a result, the schools are seeing a significant rate of youth disengaging from school as they are tending to their families.

South Coast Business is forming their summer work crews and continuing to work with high school students to meet graduation requirements through work experience and explore better paying careers. They also want to remind partners who serve tanf/snap/step recipients that they can help provide job placement services for them. Sam Engel reported that Neighborhood Works Umpqua has laid off 29 staff and there likely will be a ripple effect there as to the programs/services that reach Curry County.

Access to Healthcare- (Reminder from May Coalition meeting) Connie Hunter

They continue to support St. Tim's in their Vax clinics and are partnering with the Roseburg VA to support Veterans. One addition is that they have made an effort to reach out to families in distress especially when health issues make home situations more complex. Everything from assisting people registering online for vaccines, making sure that they have medical transportation when current there is difficultly scheduling transportation or an aversion because of COVID-19 related angst. We have provided shower chairs, thermometers, pulse oximeters, masks, sanitizer, bleach, etc. upon request from families and individuals.

Youth & Seniors - Bonnie Ell:

There are many unknowns with public health and behavioral health taking place, which leaves us feeling uncertain in how vulnerable and high-risk youth will be supported this fall (how to get condoms, adequate drug & alcohol counseling- telehealth versions are not working well for this demographic), a resource page for where youth and seniors can access needed services is needed, and a number to call for positive COVID cases.

The Curry Juvenile Department reported in May of 2021 that referrals for Youth in residential treatment have recently doubled. The APD have also identified barriers in that they can't help with mental health services unless people are 65 years of age or older and home-based caretakers for those over 65 years of age or older are needed as there is a shortage due to lack of housing.

Our workgroup will continue working on programs and services to address social isolation in youth and seniors, support youth and families in the foster system and trauma informed parent trainings.
